ODMAP Spotlight Series:

Community Action Commission of Fayette County, Ohio



Keep your community aware and prepared

OVERVIEW

Community Action Commission and local partners from across Ohio have created evidence-based templates in responding to the opioid crisis. The templates provide guidance, model language, and example forms for establishing a system to monitor local data sources, implement a response to a rapid increase in suspected overdose, and responding with harm reduction such as Hope-Bags, naloxone, and fentanyl test strips.

The template outlines spike events from major data sources including Fayette County Sheriff Report, Epicenter, Ohio Badge, Radio Reference, and the Overdose Detection Mapping Application Program (ODMAP). These systems intend to capture real-time data for suspected fatal and non-fatal overdoses. You may consider additional information sources including coroner data, 911 call center information or evidence from neighboring communities.

WHAT IS PROJECT DAWN

Project DAWN stands for "Deaths Avoided With Naloxone". Project DAWN is Ohio's network of community naloxone distribution programs. These programs are operated at a local level which provide take-home naloxone kits and overdose response training to people at risk of opioid overdoses as well as other community members who may be able to respond to an overdose.

Project DAWN is helping the community in many ways due to the network of naloxone distribution programs. Specific ways that Project DAWN is helping the community includes:

- Promoting projects and increasing outreach to those at risk to their family members
- Acting as a connection to other entities to promote use and provision of naloxone
- Assist agencies with getting more naloxone







ODMAP INTEGRATION

Community Action Commission of Fayette County utilizes ODMAP by implementing their specific steps into their overdose response strategy. These steps include...

- Having their administrators set up spike alerts and threshold alerts by setting parameters of timeframes for the alert period for immediate information on when a specific area meets or exceeds a number of overdoses within a 24-hour period.
- Community Action Commission of Fayette County enters data into ODMAP by utilizing the four mandatory data entry tabs which are location, date and time, fatal or non-fatal overdoses, and whether or not naloxone was administered, as well as the dosage of naloxone.
- Community Action Commission of Fayette County sometimes will enter additional information into ODMAP if the information is presented.
